 reported 67 new hospitalizations and 1
 death.

Vaccine

As of Jan. 13, 2010, Rock Island County
 Health Dept.(RICHD) has given a total of
 15,281 doses of H1N1 vaccine. Included
 in this number are 774 second doses to
 children 9 years of age and younger.
 RICHD has also distributed
 approximately 6,000 doses to various
 physician offices and community
 partners.

Jan. 10-16, 2010 is National Influenza
 Vaccination Week. H1N1 flu is a serious
 disease and while many cases exhibit
 relatively mild symptoms, some can be
 deadly. The amount of influenza-like
 illness in Illinois seems to be decreasing,
 but we are still seeing hospitalizations
 and deaths related to the H1N1 flu
 according to Dr. Damon Arnold, Ill. Dept.
 of Public Health Director.

There is now an ample supply of H1N1
 vaccine available in Illinois through the
 Health Dept., private physicians, and
 retail pharmacies.

Public Health Officials emphasize that
 vaccination is the most important step in
 protecting against influenza.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN SCOTT COUNTY

It's Not Too Late To Vaccinate

This is National Influenza Vaccination Week, a national observance highlighting the importance of continuing influenza vaccination into the new year.

The H1N1 vaccine is available in the community. Now is the time to protect yourself and those around you by getting vaccinated if you have not gotten around to it yet.

Influenza is unpredictable. The traditional flu season is just beginning and typically lasts until May. Although the number of H1N1 flu cases has declined recently, history tells us we need to be prepared for another wave of the disease. Testing and monitoring have shown that the H1N1 vaccine is not only safe, but also an excellent match for the H1N1 flu virus.

We again encourage people with underlying health conditions, pregnant women, children, young adults, caretakers of infants and health care workers to get vaccinated against H1N1. Unlike the seasonal flu, H1N1 has hit children, young people and adults under age 65 very hard.

While we cannot predict when it might happen or how serious the next wave of flu might be, we do know that if more people are vaccinated, the disease is less likely to spread in the coming months. Fighting the flu is a shared responsibility. We are asking everyone to do their part in protecting our community. Get vaccinated against H1N1 as well as the seasonal flu.

In addition, residents should continue everyday preventive actions, including covering coughs and sneezes, cleaning hands often with soap and water or a hand sanitizing gel, and containing germs by staying home when ill.

H1N1 Vaccine Distribution

The H1N1 vaccine continues to be available to all Iowans. Staff from the Scott County Health Department began offering the H1N1 vaccine in Scott County schools this week. With the order determined at random the following schedule is planned:

Weeks of January 11 & 18*

- Davenport Schools

Week of January 25*

- North Scott Schools
- Pleasant Valley Schools

Week of February 1*

- Bettendorf Schools
- Non public schools

*Contact your school for specific dates and times. Schedule subject to change.

Also, the H1N1 vaccine has been distributed to several doctors' offices and pharmacies. Participating pharmacies include CVS, HyVee, Main at Locust, Target, Walgreens and Wal-Mart. Please contact the pharmacies directly for locations and details.

Vaccine will also be offered on Wednesdays at the Scott County Health Department by appointment. Call 563-326-8618 for an appointment.
